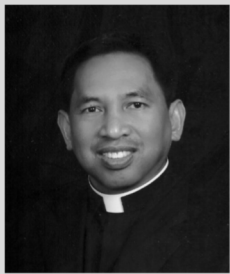

FAZtor's Notes

The Second Sunday of Easter is known as Divine Mercy Sunday. But we also hear about Thomas being a doubter and that is why we also call this Sunday "Doubting Thomas" Sunday. But there is just one clear

message: TRUST in the LORD because his MERCY is infinite!

We entrust to the mercy of the Lord our longtime parishioner **Vincent MacEvilly** who passed away on Holy Wednesday. Vince was a Knight of Holy Name and an ardent advocate of priestly vocations. He was greatly involved in the promotion for vocations to the priesthood and religious life. I still remember how he was previously helping a seminarian, who is now a priest.

Indeed, we need more vocations to the priesthood. This Saturday, April 7, 2018, three of the seminarians studying for our Archdiocese will be ordained as Transitional Deacons at St. Pius Church in Redwood City. The future priests are: **Kyle J. Faller, Ernesto M. Jandonero and Michael P. Rocha**. Unfortunately, we don't have any candidates for Priest Ordination this year. However, we have an Episcopal ordination for our newly appointed Auxiliary Bishop of San Francisco, **Bishop-elect Robert Christian, O.P.**

Bishop-elect Christian is a Friar of the Western Dominican Province and currently serves as Master of Students of the province. He is a native of San Francisco, raised in St. Brendan Parish and attended St. Brendan and St. Vincent de Paul grammar schools. In 1966 he graduated from St. Ignatius High School and from Santa Clara University in 1970. That year he entered the Dominican Novitiate in Oakland and was ordained in 1976 at St. Francis de Sales Cathedral in Oakland. He has a doctorate degree in Theology from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas (The Angelicum) in Rome and has long been a professor in Theology. He is presently a consultant to the Pontifical Council for Christian Unity and a member of the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission. His Episcopal ordination is planned to take place at St. Mary's Cathedral by the beginning of summer.

Bishop-elect Christian is 69 years old and that means he has only 6 years to serve as a bishop before a bishop's mandatory resignation at the age of 75. A priest may retire at the age of 70. But for Bishop-elect Christian, his ministry continues.

After the Holy Week, our work also continues. We have repaired our sidewalk in front of the church that has been an accident-prone walkway. We also have to continue some work and repairs at the rectory. We never run out of work, I hope we will never run out of money either. Thanks to the surplus of the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal 2017, we are able to do all this work.

*I'm glad we don't have snow during the winter. In the Midwest, they say, there are only two seasons: **Winter and Construction.***

On this Feast of the Divine Mercy I say: "God Bless you." It is not simply an expression. God bless you is a short prayer that means: "May the LORD JESUS in His Goodness, Mercy and Favor give you more than what you deserve, more than what you expect and more than what you pray for".

BLESSED DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

"The choice of the first Sunday after Easter for the feast of Mercy has a very deep theological significance. It points to the close relationship between the Paschal Mystery of our Redemption and the mystery of the Divine Mercy. The integral relationship is further emphasized by the novena of chaplets to the Divine Mercy which begins on Good Friday as a preparation for the feast. This Feast is not only a day in particular for worshipping God in His mystery of mercy, but also a time of grace for all people."

"Rise Up! Levantate! Hay Dung Len!" This is the resounding theme of this year's LA Religious Education Congress, an annual international gathering of Educators of the Faith, organized by the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Thanks to Fr. Arnold, three of us were sent to experience this great event of the Church. I was with Fr. Simon and Hilda Dela Cruz. We chose the following workshops and conferences, because of the teachings that will enhance our ministries here in our parish: 1) Rising Up to the Adult Challenge within the Gospels by Fr. Ronald Rolheiser; 2) Have You Seen Him? Searching for the Child Jesus, by Fr. Tony Ricards; 3) Thinking Bigger: The Truth About Modern Evangelization; 4) Evangelization Through Beauty by Bishop Robert Barron; 5) Encounter: From the Heart of Pope Francis, by Tony Alonso and Jeanne Cotter; 6) Ways of New Evangelization in Asia, by Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle of Manila; 7) Persecution of Christian in the World Today, by John Allen; 8) The Historical Jesus, by Fr. James Martin, S.J. It has been an enriching experience to be part of 40,000 participants, all wanting to profess, proclaim, witness our faith in the Resurrection. We enjoyed the celebration of various liturgies expressed by different cultures, in songs, dances, and many languages. Next year's Congress will be on March 21-24, 2019, at the Anaheim Convention Center. We look forward to have a larger representation from our parish. Mark your calendar and think about it!

Second Sunday of Easter (Divine Mercy Sunday) - April 8, 2018



The earliest Christian community focused strongly on the wounds of the Risen Lord for two reasons: to affirm the fact that Christ, now raised from the dead was the same person who had lived with them; and to make sense of the physical wounds being inflicted on them for Christ's sake.

The story of Thomas, even with its mystical details, counters a magical notion of what the resurrection is about. Jesus bears the marks of his torture and death. His glorified body, though different, is connected to how the disciples knew and loved him. They can recognize him through his words and his wounds.

We know the community of Ephesus, for which this Gospel is written, was experiencing great persecution. Is it any wonder, one generation after the earliest disciples, that the sign of Christ's Risen presence are his marks of suffering?

Our own world continues to be intrigued by manifestations of Jesus' wounds. Over recent years films like *Stigmata*, *Dogma*, *Agnes of God* and even the appalling *Daredevil* give a hysterical and cynical prominence to the stigmata. There are regular "believe it or not" documentaries that usually follow suit. Even some pilgrims flocked to Padre Pio's monastery in the south of Italy to see if his hands really bled, or if his wounds really wept. This desire to see outward signs of inner faith is a long way short of Jesus telling us today, "Happy are those who believe without seeing."

Our day-to-day lives should be the clearest manifestation of the cross and resurrection of Christ.

It seems, however, that words and wounds still make a claim on us today. You and I know that we don't have to go to a stigmatic to see Christian battle wounds. We carry within us the death of the Lord. We all have our wounds. And we also know that, for many of us, it is precisely when we are wounded most deeply by life, that our doubts in the presence of God can be greatest.

The Easter story is not that we should be ashamed of this, or pretend it doesn't happen. Today's Gospel reminds us that it is into this chaos that Christ comes with words of peace, with empathy from the one who was wounded for our sake and with the mission to forgive as we are forgiven.

Years ago I remember struggling with some personal issues during a retreat. One day, when I felt lowest about myself, the retreat director, adapting today's psalm, 118, said to me, "you realize that the stone rejected by the builder becomes the corner stone." By this he meant that often God takes that part of ourselves we don't like, forgives it, heals it, and uses it most powerfully to demonstrate that the pattern of the life, death, and resurrection of Christ continues in all believers who bear his name and carry his wounds.

And that's what happened to Thomas. Christ took his fears, doubts, and disbelief and transformed them into a powerful Christian witness that has sustained generations of us who struggle with life and faith.

So at this Easter Eucharist we are offered the same opportunity to discover that the stone rejected within us, or among us, is the one which God wants to use as the cornerstone. When we see this happening, when we see God taking the part of us we consider most unlovable and using it for good, then we want to cry out with the psalmist, "This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes."

Lectio Divina

Read: The Acts describe the "exceptional time of grace" among the first Christian community where everyone cared for everyone else. Tough act, but for those born of God, His commandments are not burdensome, but are spontaneous response to the gratuitous life Christ offers. The Risen Christ breaths the Holy Spirit on the apostles, and Thomas wins a personal favor from him.

Reflect: There is something about touch that human beings long for. In the garden of Eden, when the snake asked for details of God's prohibitions, Eve responded: "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden; nor shall you touch it [emphasis added], or you shall die (Gen 3:3. The prohibition of touch was not in God's original words (cf. Gen 2:17), but was an inventive amplification of Eve's desire. Jesus fully well responds to this deep desire to touch, and invites Thomas to touch him intimately and know who he is. How he, the desire of the nations, responds to the deepest and secret desires of ours! What exceptional time of Grace!

Pray: Make a prayer expressing the deepest desire of your heart. He will respond.

Act: Today, express your desire and allow yourself to be acted upon by God.
