

Pastor's Column

United we Stand, Divided we Fall – This phrase first used by the ancient Greek storyteller, Aesop, has been used by many over the ages from Patrick Henry, one of our founding fathers, to Winston Churchill in the midst of

the 2nd Word War. And if this is true for a nation and a people, it is certainly true for the Church. As we near the Presidential election, I've heard judgmental comments by some that if we don't vote a certain way, for a particular issue or for a particular candidate that we can't be true Catholics. I am saddened to see that the negative polarization that has affected our politics is also having an effect in our American Catholic Church.

The "Divide and Conquer" method of reigning over your enemies is attributed to Julius Cesar. We can it see being applied in politics to win over a segment of the population to vote for their side or their candidate. And if I was the devil, I would also use this method to weaken the effectiveness of the Church in her mission to proclaim the love of God to the people of the whole world, to help people see in each other as brothers and sisters in Christ, to build a better world together, one that Jesus came to establish and which He calls, the Kingdom of God.

Among the issues central to our faith, one that is being used to divide us is the right to life. As Catholics, we hold that all life is sacred from the moment of conception, through each stage of life from childhood, to adulthood, to old age. As the US Bishops pointed out, no one political party represents the entirety of our Catholic values and teachings. One claims to be pro-environment, that supports all living creatures, pro-healthcare for all, especially the poor, yet is pro-choice. So what is a good Catholic to do?

Some may argue that if we don't take care of Mother Earth, that it'll have devastating consequences for all life on earth and the ones who will suffer most are the poor and vulnerable. Another will argue that since life is our most cherished gift, that we have to defend the child in the womb. But as Catholics we don't have to disagree with either one and we can agree on both of them and on all issues that support life. We are probaby, pro-parents, pro-immigrant, pro-native, pro-health care, pro-black lives, pro-white lives, pro-all life including Mother Earth. Let's not allow the devil nor anyone else divide us. It may be that we work closely with babies and that is a particular issue that God has put into our heart. But let us also not negate the one who works to protect and care for our Mother Earth, or for immigrant rights, or Black lives, or incarcerated lives.

We will vote according to what the Holy Spirit will guide us and trust that God is also doing the same for the other person and not accuse others of being less Catholic than we are. Jesus taught us to leave judgement up to Him and that should be enough for us. We will not allow the Devil or politics divide us. We will Stand United. We are ultimately brothers and sisters in Christ, citizens and heirs of the Kingdom of God in Heaven. Amen?!



Our parish encourages a strong devotion to our Blessed Mother Mary, who gives us an example of faithful discipleship and a generous stewardship way of life.

TWENTY SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME OCTOBER 4, 2020

Canadian theologian Bernard Lonergan had a major impact on philosophy and theology last century. Sometimes his language was so complex we had to buy a companion book to help us read the original work! Surprisingly, however, his most important insights were very simple and expressed in very simple language. One of them was that we regularly have "ah-ha" moments, where we get an insight into God, the world or ourselves. These moments make sense of things we have previously only seen as problems.

Matthew's Gospel is filled with "ah-ha" moments. Written for a generally Jewish audience it reflects on Jesus in light of the history of Israel, the Hebrew Scriptures and the expectations of the Messiah. Jesus was for Matthew's community, and is for us, the "ah-ha" in world history. By Matthew reflecting on his life, death, and resurrection, things he had previously only wondered about now made sense.

The phrase "the stone rejected by the builders" originally referred to Israel. In Psalm 118 and, more generally, in the Book of Psalms, the trials and defeats of Israel are seen to be tests of strength, love, and endurance. Despite everything Israel has gone through, the people continue to sing of God's fidelity to them and what marvels God has done before their eyes, making them into a more faith-filled people.

Matthew, however, reflects on what happened to Jesus at the hands of the Chief Priests, Scribes and Romans. In a great "ahha" moment he sees that it is Jesus, not Israel, who is the stone rejected by the builders which has now become the key building block of a new edifice.

Doing exactly the same as Matthew does with this passage, we can apply it to our own lives as well. There are often facets of our personality or character of which we are ashamed or about which we despair. From gossip to greed, past hurts to anger, sexuality to broken relationships, we can often get discouraged at how un-together our Christian life is.

Even though we have worked hard to overcome our worst traits, we often think nothing good will ever come of them. In such a context we need to hear today's Gospel, "The stone which the builders rejected has become the cornerstone. This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes."

The parts of our character we most despise could be the most marvelous moments of amazing grace. Nothing is irredeemable to God; nothing has gone too far or become too entrenched. In the Christian life there is no room for shame, only for repentance and starting over. Looking at things we have thought of as only being problems provides us with the greatest potential for "ah-ha" moments, where the healing and love of Christ enables us to turn our lives around, to demolish all the negative and defeatist self-talk in which we can indulge and rebuild ourselves with Christ, the master builder.

Once we get into the habit of doing this, it's amazing how many "ah-ha" moments we have as our history ceases to be a problem to be overcome but turns into a challenge to be harnessed for the building up of the Kingdom of God on earth.

SAINT FRANCIS OF ASSISI (1182-1226) October 4

When Franco Zeffirelli's Brother Sun, Sister Moon was released (1972), people were shocked by the movie's graphic nudity in the dramatic conversion scene. Son of a wealthy merchant, Francis' aimless adolescence ended when a failed military expedition led to his imprisonment and complete breakdown. Once home, Francis rediscovered God in the beauty of nature and the ugliness of human suffering, caring for lepers, praying in the little church of San Damiano, whose crucified Jesus he heard calling, "Repair my house, Francis, which is falling into ruins." Francis sold his possessions—and his father's—to fulfill this command. When his father objected, Francis disrobed: "I return the clothes, your name, and all you

gave me: God alone is my Father now." Later, the pope would dream of a ragged friar stretching forth a single hand to prop up the crumbling papal Cathedral of Saint John Lateran. Francis indeed helped rebuild the universal Church, founding the Friars Minor (Franciscans), dying at a young forty-four, bearing the stigmata of the Christ whose living icon he remains—in the Church and far beyond it.
