Fifth Sunday of Easter—May 19, 2019

The word *love* has to be the most misused word in our language. We often say we love our house, our car, our holiday or even ice cream. Then we use exactly the same word to describe our feelings for our spouse, family, friends or children. If language is a window into meaning, then we are in strife at the loose way we transfer

the same word for vastly different feelings and realities. At least I hope we feel differently about people over possessions. The way some people go on about their car, pets or money we begin to wonder.

The love Jesus encourages us to have in today's Gospel is a very particular love. He tells us not just to love one another, but to "love as I have loved you." The core of Jesus' love for us is sacrificial love, where he laid down his life that we might live. While love is a popular word, and even more popular notion, in our music, film, art, and literature, sacrificial love is not something we hear much about these days or that we embrace very easily. Loving someone in the popular imagination has come to mean hanging in there until someone better comes along, or we grow bored of each other sexually or personally. Often it entails keeping the exit door on commitment nice and handy for the quick get away. But this hardly describes a love that involves sacrifice.

Sacrificial love is demonstrated in deeds not words. It states that there is no point in saying we love anyone unless our actions follow the profession we make. Sacrificial love is not just about warm and fuzzy feelings; it is an intensely practical affair where our love is judged by our gentleness, kindness, and patience with each other. Christian love is not arrogant or rude, it does not drag other people down, but rejoices and weeps when others are successful or down-hearted. Loving as Jesus has loved means telling the truth with compassion, forgiving, working at trust and holding on to faith in the face of difficult times. Jesus does not promise us that this commandment is easy, just necessary if we are to love as he loves us.

While sacrificial love demands of us that we die unto self, Jesus never asked us to "kill" ourselves. The distinction matters. All too often the Church has been guilty of giving out this teaching in a way that people thought they should put up with violent, undignified and soul-destroying behavior from their spouse, children, parents, family or friends. Sacrificial love is never destructive. It is a free gift where we sometimes forego other options, opportunities and even good things for a love and life that is even better. The Lord laid down his life for us and in turn the Father raised him up to a glorified life. What's true for him is true for us. We lay down our lives for each other so we can take up a new and richer life. We are never meant to destroy ourselves or stay in relationships that rip our dignity from us. Sometimes the most Christian thing we can do is to set up boundaries or make decisions that protect ourselves from behavior which is neither loving nor Christian.

May this Eucharist then grant us the wisdom to love people and not things. May it help us embrace sacrifice in a way that leads to life and may it give courage to sort out the relationships that affirm our dignity and help us grow in faith, hope, and love.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Frequent fliers today have many ways to accrue air miles, so one doesn't always have to endure long hours in cramped seats to earn free hours in cramped seats. In St. Paul's day, there were no such perks, nor would there have been any legal system for him to protest the shipwrecks he endured. He had other rewards in mind. The churches that he established in the catalogue of cities from today's first reading must have been very different from one another. Language, culture, customs, religious history, obstacles to community, social challenges, the places where they met, their clothing, their bread and wine, all distinct, particular to the area.

There were social customs as well: in a Christian household, the only place where a slave would be able to stand legally as an equal with the master would be at the table of the Lord, because at that table a new world of reconciliation was imaged. While Paul revered local customs, he was relentless about challenging the ways that people lived their Christian lives and how their worship reflected them. It is much the same today, as a global Catholic Church seeks to respect local customs and culture, allowing for differences in many things, yet always giving expression to the underlying presence of Christ, who binds us all together into his body.

Baptism Preparation Class for Parents, Godparents, and Sponsors



The Sacrament of Baptism, the first of the three sacraments of initiation, and is also the first of the seven sacraments in the Roman Catholic Church. It removes the guilt and effects of Original Sin and incorporates the baptized into the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ on earth.

Baptismal preparation is required for those participating in the sacrament. We offer these sessions, for the parents and godparents, every first Saturday of the month at the Pastoral Center at 1:30 PM. Please pre-register by calling the Parish office at (415) 664-8590 if you plan to attend. The parents and godparents may also attend a class in another Parish, however, a certificate of attendance must be submitted to Holy Name along with their paperwork.

The Baptism information form, and a Parish Registration form (if needed) will be given out at the Preparation class and may be returned to the instructor, or to the Pastoral Center at a later date. The time of the Baptism can then be scheduled with the Priest who will be performing the ceremony.

Baptisms are usually scheduled on Saturday mornings, after 10:00 am or Sunday mornings, after the last Mass (12:45 pm). Other arrangements can be made with the Pastor's approval for alternate days and times.

SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

May 19, 2019

A map of the ancient world will show the ambitious scope of the daring apostolic venture of Paul and Barnabas. The success of their preaching is evident, though not without difficulty. There is a subtle reference to the suffering that they had to endure (v.22). Such hardship was considered the "birth pangs" of the Messiah, the inevitable suffering that occurs when one passes from "this age" to the "age of fulfillment." The apostles were not independent missionaries. They had been sent forth by the church in Antioch, and it was to that same church that they returned and to which they reported what had been accomplished by God through them.

The responsorial psalm is a hymn of praise of the greatness of God. It contains an acclamation that is closely associated with the revelation of God and the acknowledgment of God's name revealed at the time of the reestablishment of the covenant (cf. Exod 34:6). Here the covenant has been expanded to a universal embrace. In this light, the covenanted faithful ones are called, not only to praise God for the wonders that God has accomplished in and for them, but also to announce the glory of God's rule to the entire human race, to all the children of Adam.

In the second reading, several images are used to characterize the new reality that will be brought forth in the age of fulfillment. John speaks of a new heaven and new earth. The disappearance of the sea signifies the end of chaos' threat and the beginning of something new. The new Jerusalem will be for the people of the new age what the former Jerusalem was for the people of the past, namely, the dwelling place of God. The old order has passed away, along with death and tears. The reading ends in a summary note: All things are made new.

The departure of Judas sets into motion the machinery of Jesus' arrest, trial, and execution. There is no going back now. The die is cast; the events of salvation are about to begin. The hour of eschatological fulfillment has come. While it looks like only suffering and death are on the horizon, this is in fact the moment of glorification. Lifted up in ignominy, Jesus will really be lifted up in glory, for surrender, death, resurrection, and exaltation are really all one event. Jesus' willingness to suffer also glorifies God, for it reveals the extent of Jesus' love for God and God's love for humankind. Jesus addresses the remaining eleven apostles with the affectionate address of a teacher to students, "my children." It is followed by the commandment to love one another. This kind of love will be the universal sign of discipleship of Jesus. It will establish a new kind of order. The disciples are to love one another as Jesus has loved them. © Dianne Bergant CSA
