SAVED BY THE ONE WHO WAS REJECTED

Some city teenagers often scorn and reject farm kids. Yet it's no exaggeration to say that humanity owes its life to farmers who care for the world's crops and livestock. This week's scriptures remind us that Jesus was as rejected as a shepherd, a farm boy, yet we

FAZtor's Notes

The Holy Name Chinese Bible Study Group, in conjunction with the Chinese Ministry of the Archdiocese of San Francisco held a Post Easter Retreat "Live Out the Will of God" at the Flanagan Center last Saturday, April 14. It was attended by 150 participants from different parishes around the Bay Area. The speaker was Fr. Francis Ching from the Companions of the Cross Community in Canada. The retreat was an outreach effort of Holy Name of Jesus to the Chinese Communities in the Bay Area. In addition, it was a fundraising opportunity for the Companions of the Cross Community.

Fr. Francis Ming Chung Ching, was born in HK in 1972 into a Catholic family and immigrated to Toronto in 1986. He entered seminary preparation in 1998, joined his community in 1999, and was ordained in 2005. Fr. Ching was born with glaucoma and was diagnosed legally blind. His eye condition was severely worsened four years into his first assignment at St. Timothy Parish in Toronto. The condition was stabilized after two surgeries but he lost the ability to read as a result. Fr. Ching is now doing full-time evangelization work: half of his time in providing formation and training for the Fountain of Love and Life, a Chinese media evangelization charitable organization that produces a weekly TV and radio program; the rest of his time he gives retreats and workshops. Fr. Ching is also the spiritual director for Eastern Canada Chinese Catholic Living Camp.

So, last Saturday, our parish opened our doors to Chinese retreatants from all over the Bay Area. Then last Sunday afternoon, we opened our doors and welcomed 17 Catholic pilgrims all the way from China, from Wenzhou Diocese, our parochial vicar Fr. Simon's diocese in China. Fr. Simon had a mass with them and a reception after the mass.

I was so happy to welcome them and wished I knew how to speak their dialect. I tried to say a wish in Chinese but they did not understand because I was saying it in Cantonese and they only understand Mandarin. I had to go through Fr. Simon to translate my message for them. Nobody seemed to know English either. But it did not matter. We were able to exchange pleasantries.

Reminds me of this anecdote:

Japanese eat little fat, Mexicans eat lots of fat, yet both suffer less heart attacks than Americans.

Chinese drink little wine, Italians drink lots of wine, yet they also suffer less heart attacks than Americans.

Germans drink lots of beer, eat lots of sausages, yet they also suffer less heart attacks than Americans.

Conclusion?

Eat and drink what you like.

Speaking ENGLISH is what kills you!

Take to heart this Chinese proverb:

"An inch of time is an inch of gold, but you cannot buy that inch of time with an inch of gold."

"Time is like a river. You cannot touch the same water twice, because the flow that has passed will never pass again."

Enjoy every moment of life with righteousness and God will always protect you.



FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

April 22, 2018

Sometimes a piece of theater can be so powerful it stays with you for your whole life. Many years ago I saw Jesuit dramatist Michael Moynahan perform his mime entitled "Come-Passion." It starts with a clown hap-

pily doing tricks and juggling for the audience. Soon, Jesus is led in by the soldiers and is crucified. The clown watches on in horror. When Jesus dies and the soldiers go home the clown remains at the foot of the cross. He removes the nails from the hands and feet of Jesus and cradles the corpse in his lap, as in Michelangelo's Pieta. He weeps for the evil that saw a just man crucified. Just then, the soldiers return and find the clown grieving over the body of Jesus. They crucify the clown. The clown suffers and dies on the cross. As they leave Jesus is raised to life, he sees the suffering clown, removes the nails, cradles him in his arms and holds him for what feels like an eternity.

When I saw this mime you could have heard a pin drop, and there wasn't a dry eye in the house.

The word compassion comes from the Latin word *compati* meaning to bear or suffer with. It's not pity, sympathy or commiseration. Those words imply that we stand outside an experience and feelingly look in on it. Compassion is about "fellow-feeling." It's what the Good Shepherd embodies, and what Easter is all about. If we are worthy followers of Jesus we will all have our fair share of Good Fridays, but Easter Sunday tells us that just as the Father remained faithful to Jesus, so Jesus will remain faithful to us, as one with us.

In recent years the bishops, who are often called shepherds of the local Church, have come under extraordinary scrutiny. And rightly so. All of us who are living the Christian life are accountable for what we have done and have failed to do, and the bishops are no exception. It's a tough time to be the local shepherd. The flock is highly educated and we no longer follow anyone's lead with a herd mentality. We want to know our shepherd, hear his compassionate voice call for justice for victims everywhere, but especially ones who have been injured in any way by the Church. We want to be confident that what our local shepherd says and does is what Christ the Good Shepherd would say and do. Over these past years our sense of dismay has come from a very few bishops who have chosen the so-called good name of the church, its social status and power, their public profile and even the threat of moral and financial liability over the voices of the most vulnerable members of our flock.

Today's Gospel reminds us what Christian leadership should look like. Jesus didn't liken it to princes in palaces or governors of provinces. His metaphor was of a compassionate shepherd who sleeps in the field with his flock, one who knows them so well and loves them so dearly that he lays down his own life for them.

Let's pray at this Eucharist that we always have the leaders we deserve, ones whose compassion is so transparent that it inspires us to be the same, even towards them.

Lectio Divina

Read: There is no name other than the Name of Jesus that brings salvation. Peter highlights the cure of the man with the handicap as the proof. John speaks of the singular love of God that transforms us to be like Him. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for the sheep.

Reflect: How big is this family of the shepherd? How big is the sheep community? Jesus makes explicit references to other sheep that are also his, but do not necessarily belong to "this" fold, but whom he must lead as well so that finally there shall be one sheep and one shepherd. The redeeming name of Jesus is meant not just for a small group of Christians or the so-called "good" but for the entire world. The singular love of God cannot be limited to a select few, but flows into the hearts of all. It is not God who rejects us, but we who reject God and one another in the name of God and creed. Perhaps becoming like God demands that we conform to the heart of the Shepherd who cares for all sheep.

Pray: Good Shepherd, mould my heart after yours.

Act: Listen to the God-experience of someone who belongs to a faith tradition different from yours.

Dedicated poll workers help maintain the integrity of the election process by serving at polling places across the City on Election Day. Poll workers have a shared mission to protect voter rights, serve voters with respect, and assist all voters with casting their vote. Being a poll worker is an exceptional opportunity to learn about the election process and serve your community while earning a stipend of up to \$195.

If you are interested in serving as a poll worker and meet the qualifications, we encourage you to apply! To serve as a poll worker, you must: be 18 years old and a U.S. citizen, and a registered voter in California or a non citizen with permanent resident status who would otherwise be eligible to vote; communicate effectively and follow written instructions; attend a mandatory in-person training class prior to each election; provide assistance to all voters.
